By senior year of high school, she had found the answer to all her seeking and joined the Catholic Church.

At college, Carolina began attending Mass at Prince of Peace in Kearney. Not being Catholic for long, she had no idea of the existence of Newman Centers. Once she found St. Teresa's Newman Center on campus, she found Catholics her own age, living the same kind of life she was living. "Having friends that value the Church helped me to grow in love with the Catholic Church," she

Working in the Catholic Schools has been a tremendous blessing. It is not everywhere that an art project can turn into a theological discussion! Being able to help her students find that goodness and beauty in each other and in the Church is what drives her commitment to her students.
