Friends in Christ,

It is hard to believe, but the fall semester is nearly complete. The trees have dropped most of their leaves and the wind has brought a mix of warm air by day and cool air by night. Everyone is ready to be on break, but thankfully not from each other!

Starting back this fall, we had less restrictions than in 2020 but we still carried ourselves with caution. It was strange to see how everyone was adjusting to live together after everything we had been through in the last year. The students were eager to be with one another, but cautious about what that meant.

Our fall outreach was fruitful, bringing in a good new class of freshmen. We welcomed them with food and a carnival during the first week of class! The Knights of Columbus cooked for us while the students ran various games to win tickets. There was even a dunk tank!! It was a great encounter that lasted until 9pm Mass.

The semester seemed to be focused on retreat more than anything. We hosted 3 retreats this fall: our busy person retreat, koinonia and a retreat at the Cloisters on the Platte. The students have many opportunities to encounter Jesus in various ways during these retreats. It is so powerful to see them be found by our Lord, to be loved by our Lord.

Through our experiences of sacraments, adoration and retreats, the students have drawn close to one another as well. One very powerful experience happened during October. One of our students lost her mom to covid. As her mom was going through the process of dying, the students rallied around her. When her mom passed, the students rushed to comfort her and the family. We offered a Mass for her mom and the chapel filled to 70% capacity on a Friday afternoon. They bought flowers and signed a card filled with notes of support and comfort. Some of them were able to make it to the funeral Mass as well. It was so touching that these students showed love and support during such a difficult time.

Our bible studies and resident life have also gone well this fall. We have very strong small group discipleship going as well as 11 students living in the houses. The friendships are growing through these things, and they hold each other accountable to growing in the faith. One thing I am very proud of them for is their rally to support the philosophy department at UNK. The students value their education and desire to have the opportunity to study the humanities during their time at college. It is inspiring to see that their challenge to one another and their desire for faith has opened up their thirst for all higher things. It is fun to get into a philosophical discussion from time to time around the Newman Center, it reminds me of seminary!

Growing in authentic friendship is the goal of our mission. When we grow this way, our soul begins to thirst for more than this life can provide. We open our hearts to receive something more, to receive the grace, mercy and love of God. He gives those good things through sacraments and through the community.

May God continue to bless us in this mission! God bless all of you!

NOTES FROM THE DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR

Some very exciting things have been happening at the Newman Center recently. We are very grateful for the ways in which God has blessed our mission and the work in front of us.

In March of 2021 a group of key parties including Bishop Joseph Hanefeldt, other diocesan leadership, Newman Center staff, and consultants identified several important opportunities to ensure the sustainability of the Newman Center at UNK for generations to come. In addition to outlining a plan to advance the Newman Center building project, the team initiated efforts to focus on and develop our business plan.

Since that time, we've made tremendous progress to strengthen organizational infrastructure and establish the Newman Center's development program. As a part of this work, the Steier Group was hired to facilitate a planning study to assess the feasibility of launching a capital campaign, which just concluded at the end of October.

I want to take a moment to thank everyone again who participated in the study. We have been blown away by the positive feedback and generosity of our friends and alumni, and are excited to share more about the results and our plan moving forward in the near future.

In the coming days, we will continue to work towards raising sufficient funds to move forward with the building project, as well as establish operational sustainability. Over the past several months the UNK Newman Center has made significant strides in strengthening its development program and advisory board. The results of the Steier Group's Planning Study were encouraging in the broad community support that they revealed. Building upon this momentum, the Newman Center will continue laying a foundation upon which strong and lasting ministries can be grown, broad donor support can be garnered, and a future facility can be built.

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
FOCUS Missionaries: In Their Own Words

"My senior year of college I had an encounter that made me realize the Eucharist was the body and blood of Christ. After that point, I knew it was my mission to make that known to the world!"





Pastoral Formation takes a seminarian beyond the classroom and the seminary community to direct an ongoing interaction with a wide variety of people and circumstances to grow in the call to ministry.

Seminarians are given opportunities to develop the gifts and skills needed to become true servants of God's people through:

- Assisting with religious education classes in local parishes
- Visiting residents in skilled care/assisted living facilities
- Serving at a ministry kitchen
- Ministry centers
- Hispanic immersion weekend
- Inner city weekend

Emphasis on Christian service is basic to a man's preparation for priestly ministry, is valuable to formation and contributes to the seminarian's human and spiritual development. Seminarians are provided support and guidance from seminary staff and guest speakers to develop the skill of theologically reflecting on their ministry experiences in the light of the Gospel.

During the last year of my collegiate experience at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln I decided to go see what all the hype was about at the Newman Center. At that time I wasn't interested in Catholicism, I was simply just searching for some other meaning in life and what my purpose was. The reason for this search was that my track and field career was over, and I was lost. What I found at the Newman Center was other young men and women that were very relatable and were going through some of the same problems I seemed to be having at the time and who were also experiencing similar joys in life. It was my first ever exposure to devout young men. I couldn't believe how radically different they were than me. 
