campus for the student organization fair when the Newman table stopped him. They invited Caleb to Welcome Week activities at the Newman Center. Caleb showed up on Sunday thinking, "I might as well get a free meal out of it," without so much as imagining what else he might "get out of it". That very night, after being introduced to other students by a FOCUS missionary, Caleb noticed that there was something different about the Newman Center. "I saw that everyone really cared about each other, they radiated love that was easy to see. I wanted to explore why."

Caleb was invited to daily Mass the next day and started going to Mass more frequently than ever before. He joined a Bible study and attended activities and retreats. In addition, Caleb eventually became a lector and altar server.

Now a Sophomore, Caleb leads his own bible study. "I was commissioned as a disciple with FOCUS, and when I was asked to lead my own bible study, I took it to prayer and felt peace and joy." Caleb desires to share what he had found at the Newman Center with others. "Hospitality doesn't mean anything if the person invited in doesn't carry that to other people and help them grow their own faith."

Following the example of St. Teresa of Calcutta, the patron of the student parish, Caleb welcomes new students, as he says, **"by doing all of the small things—offering a smile, saying 'hi', remembering their name, and inviting them."**

John Vanderbeek, while a student at UNK in the early 90s, suddenly found himself needing a different housing situation. He was invited to live at the Newman Center. Five years later, his now wife, Crystal, applied to live in the Blue House.

"The friendship and support of the girls in the house meant I could come back from being out in the world to people that really knew me." John agrees and adds, "the Newman Center provided the fellowship that laid the foundation to grow in my faith." Being welcomed into the community at Newman gave them both the desire to learn more and grow in their faith.

John and Crystal Vanderbeek have carried that desire for their Catholic faith into what is clearly their calling in life, Catholic Education. John is the Assistant Principal at Kearney Catholic High School. Crystal is the director of Little Fish Preschool, the second preschool the couple helped start, having also opened the Catholic preschool in Hastings.

For Crystal, the goal is supporting families. "Walking with families is part of our daily life." John sees a great need to give his students a strong Catholic identity as they leave high school. As part of their strategic planning, Kearney Catholic has invited students from the Newman Center into the school to speak to their students. "They get so enveloped in 'high school stuff'. The Newman Center is the next step in bringing the trajectory forward in their faith."

John sees the spiritual battleground on college campuses and wants his students to be prepared. "The Eucharist that we elevate and venerate is so different from what is held up in most college classes today." Crystal adds, "People need to know that a strong Newman Center...is vital to have solid families and vocations."
