Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

It is hard to be Catholic. The greatest tension is being able to freely live out our call to holiness in today's world. That is never easy, but with so many forces working against the basic and great commission to go and make disciples of all nations it has become extremely difficult. One of the marks of the enemy's presence is a sense of darkness, heaviness, anxiety, and fear. Life just feels very heavy and dark right now. It is so taxing on us personally, as family, and as the Church. It is easy to lose hope when everything is so bleak. Every conversation, every encounter, every day of work is marred by negative outlooks. It is easy to give up on ourselves and our communities. What is more, people feel abandoned by the Church – they feel unheard, unwanted or uncared for.

Sadly in many cases, this is not just a sense they have, but a reality. This has led so many to

In her time as a Loretto sister, Mother Teresa was sent to India to serve. She cared for children for many years as a sister of Loretto. On one occasion, traveling by train to a retreat, she heard the voice of Jesus say to her, "come be my light". She discerned that to be her call within a call. She looked out at the darkness around her, the darkness of loneliness and pain, the darkness of being forgotten, the darkness of being trapped in a hopeless situation. She made a vow to Jesus – to love Him more than He has ever been loved.

When she dawned the now iconic white sari with blue pinstripes and walked into the midst of that darkness, by loving the people, by caring for the people, by getting to know the people, she became a beacon of light and hope for everyone she encountered.

This summer, we have been reflecting as a Newman Center on our call from God. We are here for one purpose – to be the light of Jesus Christ on this campus. To love Him more than He has ever been loved. As we prayed with this call, so many pieces came into alignment for the mission and future of the Newman Center. 
